### Finding Courage

here is something powerful about loving a horse. It's deep and stirring, and inspires people to accomplish things outside their comfort zone, beyond what they imagine possible. Danielle, a Camelot student who has congenital hypotonia benign, is a timid young lady; when she wraps her arms around Scout's neck, she's not just embracing him for that moment. She's embracing a new future for herself, one that takes courage and faith.

Danielle is provided this opportunity because of another group of people who also demonstrate great courage and faith: our donors. They believe in the ripple effect that takes place when Danielle picks up a brush and cares for her Camelot steed. Our program doesn't exist solely on the sweat of our volunteers, and the desire in students' hearts alone. It takes more than that. It takes a community reaching deep and donating to keep Camelot here for years to come.

We ask you to reach deep and ask your friends do the same. Camelot will only survive with your help.

In May, I was surprised when Danielle asked to canter. I believed she could; I also understood the fear she overcame learning to trot, and wondered if she knew what she was asking. There was only one way to find out.

The last day of classes, I told Danielle I would teach her to canter. It wasn't easy for her, but she did it! Huge smile on her face, huffing and puffing from the physical exertion, Danielle did it! While reaching deep inside herself, she found courage, drive and determination and she succeeded.

Asking for money is not easy, more terrifying than cantering for the first time. Please embrace Camelot, find the courage that Danielle found, and give generously.

Not one day of classes could exist without our community's support. Most donors aren't here to see Andrea, who is visually impaired, ride independently on Bravo. They don't share in Danielle's triumph as she learns to canter, or share her sister Chantal's exhilaration as she learns to jump a fence while on Cayanna's back. They don't witness Isabel, who is deaf and has cochlear implants, learn sign language during her riding lesson with her mentor Sara, a fellow Camelot student and aspiring riding instructor. But Camelot donors have faith they are changing people's lives through their financial support.

There is an amazing clarity taking place when wheelchairs are left behind and students leave hoof prints in their wake. Ranch life is a powerful, yet simple life, and it changes how one thinks. People no longer wonder what their potential is; they know what greatness they are capable of achieving.

I ride the horse. Walking, walking. I walk in circles, Walking, walking, "Are you ready?" She says, Asking, asking, I breathe deeply and I say "Yes", Preparing, preparing, The horse begins and goes faster, Running, running, I find my rythm, and I am in the air, Flying, flying.

Those of us whose lives have been changed by Camelot are members of an amazing family. We've learned to recognize how the simple life can lead to grand things. We've learned how simple acts of perseverance can open doors and change people's perceptions of their own capabilities. Thank you for supporting Camelot and for creating opportunities for our riders. Please continue to share in Danielle's courage, by believing in Camelot's tomorrow, and donating to our program today.

I watched the deep emotion that penetrates a horse's soul when carrying students with disabilities. I marveled at how Camelot's students stretched their

If the students can do it, why can't I, even in my golden years? I learned from the Camelot experience that there are no barriers that can't be overcome if you want and love something this much. I was in heaven when riding Bravo in the desert, just him and me, the wind blowing in our faces, his ears rotated back to listen, his head swinging

happily back and forth.

One step more, I want my own horse. Silly girl, you're now over 70 years old. Aah, think again. The students stretch their boundaries to the very core of their souls; the thrill of being free, being with and riding these marvelous creatures. Why can't I? If not now, when?

At age 73, Mickey, a 14-year-old paint gelding, came into my life. I had the opportunity to have him as my own, my very first horse. My relationship with Mickey is a continuing love story. If I'm not riding him, then we hang out together. I enjoy every moment with him. He constantly surprises me with his patience, wisdom and humor. He nibbles my neck, or knocks my hat askew if I'm not giving him the attention he thinks he deserves.

From the bottom of my heart, thank you, Camelot. At my age I am living the great adventure of having my own horse.
